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From the Streets of Kampala to University President!

When my father died in 1997, I was six months old; I was raised with three siblings by a single mother. Following his death, my mother was left to take care of us without any support. This put a lot of stress on her, and life was tough for all of us.

I was sent to primary school but there I was beaten. I became so miserable to the extent that I would hide in the bushes and go home late in the evening. When I couldn't take the struggles at home and the struggles at school anymore, I ran away and went to the streets in Kampala. I made this decision at age 9.

Life was hard, but I managed to survive by searching through rubbish and collecting sacks full of discarded plastic bottles. I would sell a sack to be able to buy myself a chapatti and something to drink.

My hand to mouth survival on the streets continued in this way for two years until I met the Aunties and Uncles from Abaana who gave me the opportunity to come off the streets. I joined Abaana's New Life Homes (NLH). I was given love, care, and attention, was taught how to read and write and I was empowered to aspire for more in life. Despite my earlier challenges at school, education became interesting, and I progressed really well.

During this time, Abaana reunited me with my family, and I was reconciled with my mother. It was a very emotional time but was a necessary process of catharsis. Through tears I apologised for running away, leaving her to think the worst, that I had died or was enslaved. And she apologised for the way she took her bitterness out on me after Dad passed away.

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I continued living at NLH as Mum still didn't have the means to care for me. I really thrived with Abaana's support and encouragement, and I gained leadership responsibilities throughout school. I was a prefect in Primary School, Head Prefect at Secondary School and was elected the president of the School of Psychology during my undergraduate degree at Makerere University.


I am ecstatic that I am now a university graduate with a bachelor's degree in Community Psychology and Mental Health. I want to continue to better myself and I have applied to do a master's degree in human rights so I can fight for equality and dignity for all people and advocate for children's rights. In the meantime, I am gaining as much experience as possible by volunteering at a refugee settlement in Northern Uganda.

God has been so good to me and has carried me through the tough times. I would like to thank Abaana and all of my sponsors who have believed in me and helped to give me a fighting chance at life. You will always be counted as part of my family.

Zuri Girl has been created in response to the overwhelming challenges that girls in Africa face on a daily basis. Zuri means 'beautiful' in Swahili, and we want to make sure that the girls we work with feel beautiful inside and out. Sanitary items are a luxury and when you don't have enough to buy the basic necessities, luxury items are far out of reach. Girls end up using dirty rags which can lead to infection and missing valuable school days for fear of leakage and total embarrassment. Zuri Girl project provides training for our teachers and girls to make their own reusable, eco-friendly sanitary towels, learn more about health and hygiene and give them a good foundation of self-esteem.

Currently we are supporting girls with sanitary wear and new pants through our child sponsorship scheme. It is maybe hard for us to understand how much of a difference something this simple can make, but let Harriet share her thoughts:

As the sanitary towels were being given out in


a school, one girl was so excited she couldn't stop smiling. She said, "Thank you Abaana for thinking about us. Times have surely been bad and our parents don't usually give us these items because there is no money. I am happy to have received these pads and knickers. I will not lose hope and my life has been made comfortable. I am sure to attend classes regularly even during my periods as I can't be ashamed. Thank you so much."

Susan Sendege, who recently graduated with a first-class honours degree in statistics from Makerere University, is one who simply would not give up on their ambitions and went against the numbers!

When Susan was in lower primary, his parents were unable to meet the minimal school fees and he was moved to a Government school, but the quality was very poor. A short while later, Abaana's sponsorship programme was introduced to his previous school, and the option was given to him to return to New Foundations, in Primary 3, under the sponsorship scheme. Susan's life completely changed due to this opportunity. He determined to work very hard achieving excellent results at GCSE-level and one of the highest possible scores at A-level. Looking back, he marvels at his journey: 'I had no hope of attending the good schools Abaana's sponsorship enabled me to. (I would have been) a school dropout.'

His outstanding performance enabled him to study at Makerere University and his first-class honours degree is an incredible achievement. Susan says it is a dream come true and he is currently working in research with his former supervisor and is confident he will be able to contribute to the development of Uganda. Susan is certain that it was God's hand on his life, together with the support of his family and his sponsor, that has enabled him to achieve this exceptional level of success.

Susan's sponsor, Rachel, said 'His story brings home to me the importance of sponsorship and I am happy to have been a part of Susan's journey, albeit a small part.' 2020 was supposed to be the year in which Rainey Primary was completed, but due to Covid-19 the team from Rainey Endowed School, Magherafelt were unable to travel to help build the second classroom block. We look forward to the time when teams can safely travel once more. Thankfully, work is still going on!

Since the first phase of building at Rainey Summit View Primary School began in 2019, pupil attendance has increased by more than 60%. The school has been hugely popular, yet this puts a strain on the existing sanitation facilities. Every break time sees long queues of children waiting to use the toilet.

The 485 pupils will be overjoyed when they return to school to see a brand-new toilet block installed. Special thanks go out to the team at Pebble who have generously funded the project.

COVID Relief Continues

Sadly, COVID is still far from under control and restrictions are currently in place in Uganda, which have meant that the schools have been in a long period of lockdown. We felt it only right therefore that we continue to provide relief and aid where we could, given the restrictions in Uganda, and over the past 18 months, thanks to our incredible supporters have raised in excess of £100,000 to help those in need.

Here are some brief insights and pictures to give you a flavour of the situation faced by many and what Abaana has been able to do in response.

We worked with a number of the Abaana school communities and were able to deliver and distribute relief items such as food (flour, beans & salt) and hygiene items such as soap.

One of the sponsored children, Catherine (15), who received aid, comes from a family of 8 and the pandemic was harsh on them. Most of her family members were sick and they spent vital monies on medication leaving them short in being able to purchase food. Catherine said, "thank you so much for the food and soap... Life is going to be better. God bless Abaana and the sponsors".





Our team in Uganda also sought to complement the Ugandan government's efforts by supporting health centres with hygiene items, such as liquid soap, hand sanitizer & foot operated hand washing facilities to help equip them in their fight against the pandemic. A nurse from one centre said "We really appreciate this donation because you have equipped us to fight against COVID-19 and may God bless Abaana so much".

Paul, a sponsored child, was so excited to receive the aid given and smiled as he said to the Abaana staff, "I am very happy for this food because at least I am sure that we shall have a meal today and for some days ahead. Sometimes we don't know how we shall survive because my parents are not as busy as they used to be before lockdown, and I think they don't get enough money to provide everything for us. I thank you for this support and God bless you".

So, on behalf of the children and families who received this aid, may we thank you, our supporters and sponsors for helping to provide once again, we are truly very grateful.

Successful Surgery Means it is Playtime Again!

Leus, one of our sponsored children, is an elevenyear-old boy in Primary 3 at Strathearn Primary school in Kampala, Uganda. During a routine visit by our staff, it was noticed that Leus seemed to be miserable and in some pain. Upon questioning Leus, he showed our staff a wound on his foot that was causing him pain and rendering him unable to play with the other children. The pain was so great it was affecting his schooling and hence his learning and development.

Leus stays with his grandmother and unfortunately, she had been unable to provide Leus with the medical support he required. Once our staff understood the extent of the challenge, they were able to contact Corsu Orthopaedic Hospital and Leus was admitted for surgery. His medical diagnosis was Chronic Osteomyelitis which is an infection of the bone. It seems that

several years ago he got a deep cut on his foot which then became infected and left untreated led to him needing surgery to remove the dead bone.


The surgery was successful and Leus recovered well. Now Leus will be able to join with his friends as he walks to school pain free, he can focus on his schooling and he can play!


Bringing Education to Another Village

New School Project – St. Mary's Primary

To date, Abaana has built 16 primary schools in Uganda.

These schools help to educate over 5,000 children, giving them a chance to break free from the poverty cycle. However, there are still many villages across Uganda that have no school or a very poor school structure and untrained teachers trying their best to educate the children with little or no resources.

The next school we want to focus on is St. Mary's in the east of Uganda.





The school was started in 2007 by the Church of Uganda who wanted to promote education in the area. It has 10 teachers, but they are only paid between £10 and £20 a month.

The school is built on eight acres of church land. It runs from Nursery to Primary 6, with some classes under trees, some classes in temporary structures and it has one semi-permanent building. The school has 255 children registered.

The first stage of a school building project is to build two classroom blocks (consisting of seven classrooms and an office), toilets and to provide furniture which altogether costs around £80,000. Abaana is looking for partners who can help partially fund a school (e.g. a classroom at £10,000), fund a whole school or fundraise towards the general building. Are you up for the challenge?
